Take a Moment... for Joy

Bishop David Bard, encourages us to carve out time for joy-filled moments, so that we may have the capacity to care for the world's pain and suffering ...

In college I double-majored in philosophy and psychology. Here is a question I never ask a young person in college: "What are you going to do with that?" I rather tired of answering it years ago. There are even jokes associated with being a philosophy major. Yet there are encouraging moments. Remember when the Wizard in *The Wizard of Oz* tells the Scarecrow that he has all the brains he needs, only lacking a diploma, and awards him an honorary Th.D., "Doctor of Thinkology," degree. The Scarecrow immediately recites, "The sum of the square roots of any two sides of an isosceles triangle is equal to the square root of the remaining side," and then declares, "Oh joy, rapture!" Joy and rapture in thinking—words to warm the heart of a philosophy major.

Ten years ago, the philosopher Leszek Kołakowski,... <u>published an essay</u> in which he argued that "happiness as an immutable condition is not accessible to us." Fun thought, perhaps one that would have been best left within the confines of small philosophy departments. Not a lot of joy and rapture there.

Kołakowski reasoned that "being truly human involves the ability to feel compassion, to participate in the pain and joy of others." If so, then happiness, as an immutable condition, is not possible. "This is not just because we experience suffering. It is also because, even if we are not suffering at a given moment, even if we are able to experience physical and spiritual pleasure and moments beyond time, in the 'eternal present' of love, we can never forget the existence of evil and the misery of the human condition. We participate in the suffering of others." While permanent, unbroken happiness is impossible in this argument, "there is no reason to maintain that the things we experience as good... must all be seen as pure negation. Such experiences strengthen us; they make us spiritually healthier."

Psychologist Mary Pipher, in a <u>recent guest essay</u> for *The New York Times*, offers thoughts along the same lines. "I am leading a double life. Underneath my ordinary good life, I am in despair for the world. Some days, the news is such that I need all my inner strength to avoid exhaustion, anxiety and depression. . . . The most informed and compassionate among us are the most vulnerable to despair." Yet in her essay, Pipher discusses skills for navigating such a world, including doing the good we can and taking time to appreciate beauty. She encourages us to "balance our despair with joy." She concludes, "life is so terrible and beautiful at the same time. Do I have the capacity to hold it all in my heart?"

There is much in the world to weary us, to weigh down our souls, and to break our hearts... Yet we cannot walk away. If we are to be truly human,...we need to understand and participate in the pain and suffering of the world. Our Scriptures encourage us to remember that when one part



of the body suffers, we all suffer (1 Corinthians 12:26). At the same time, should not wallow discouragement. We should not allow ourselves to be overwhelmed. We need to take time and enjoy moments where we celebrate, ponder in awe, know joy, appreciate beauty. It is okay, even necessary, to bracket out some of the suffering for a time. I think of the words of the poet Wendell Berry:

When despair for the world grows in me and I wake in the night at the least sound in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be, . . .

I come into the peace of wild things . . .
I rest in the grace of the world, and am free
I think of the words of Sister Maura Eichner...

Eat bread. Drink wine. Try to sing the song of Christ. Live life. If you can dance, dance. Everywhere grace awaits. Desire to love to love.

These poets echo encouragement from our Scriptures. "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice" (Philippians 4:4). "There is nothing better for mortals than to eat and drink, and find enjoyment in their toil. . . . God gives wisdom and knowledge and joy" (Ecclesiastes 2:24, 26). And if you really want a bit of a scriptural surprise encouraging us to take time for joy, read the book of Song of Songs.

The world is terrible and beautiful. Take time for the beauty. Go for a walk on a warm summer evening. Listen to music. Dance if you like, even if you are by yourself. Hold the hand of a loved one. Cuddle a child. Appreciate a painting. Swim in a cool lake on a hot day. Savor a favorite food. Take in the aroma while it is being prepared. Watch the fireflies at night. Pray a prayer only of joy and gratitude. Read a poem. Read a story. Watch a movie. Laugh at a silly joke. Add your ideas to this list.

Such moments are good for the soul. They increase our heart's capacity to hold the beautiful and the terrible. These experiences strengthen us. They make us spiritually healthier. I think they are also acts of profound faith. We trust that God in Jesus Christ loves this world, and that God is always working in this world toward peace, justice, reconciliation, generosity, care, Beloved Community, beauty, and love. Trusting that, it does us good to bask in such goodness for a bit, and to do so regularly. We don't ignore the deep pain and suffering of the world, but we also don't give it exclusive rights to dominate our souls.

Did I just take quite a lot of time encouraging you to take a moment or two to enjoy yourselves? Yes, but remember, I was a philosophy major.

How OUMC is Supporting Oxford Youth in Education

Dragonfly Hybrid, an extension of Oxford Virtual Academy, has partnered with Oxford United Methodist Church to provide a safe,



hybrid-learning (online and in-person learning) environment by utilizing our classrooms throughout the building. You may have already noticed many changed happening throughout the church building. How exciting it will be to see youth in our hallways!



Dragonfly Hybrid administrators, Jenni Stec (owner - left), Erin Edwards (Executive Director - middle), and Jasmine Weis (Director - right), will be onsite Tuesdays and Thursdays with staff and students from 7:30am – 4:00pm, with some arrival and departure times varying on those days. Additionally, you may see them present on the off-schedule days for planning and other school related items. We hope that you extend a warm welcome to them!

The first day of school for students was August 25th and the last day is June 1st. Although you can come by the church at any time, we ask that you limit your time on Tuesdays and Thursdays to keep from interfering with the learning times for the students. Additionally, Dragonfly Hybrid's designated parking lot and entrance is on the backside of the church so you may find it easier to park in the front and enter through the Burdick Street entrance for ease and less congestion if you need to come to the church on school session days. The students that will be attending are in grades ranging from 6th grade to 12th grade. As of mid-August, the enrollment numbers are around 40. We look forward to inviting them to participate in church activities, events, and services along with supporting the school with the same.

For safety and security, we ask that you refrain from letting any Dragonfly Hybrid staff members in without one of their administrators present. Staff and students are to always be monitored by Dragonfly Hybrid administrators as they are the only ones that have keys to the church. With that said, we also request that you, our church members and guests, do not ask Dragonfly Hybrid staff to open the doors for you as they cannot be held liable either.

It is best to either wait for the person in your party that has a key or come during Becky's office hours. This helps us to know who is coming and going for the safety of the students, the staff of the school and church, and our members.

If at any time you have questions or concerns about the school, please contact either Christy Turk or Amy Fleischer. We are the co-chairs to the implementation of the school and can give you the most accurate information. It is imperative that we do not address questions or concerns to the administrators of Dragonfly Hybrid directly. Amy and I are the point-of-contact and will happily discuss anything with you by phone, email, or an in-person meeting.

We truly believe we have been blessed with the opportunity to support our community, especially our youth, in a positive way. Educating youth in a safe environment is one that we are proud to be a part of and look forward to supporting Dragonfly Hybrid in this quest for years to come. The implementation of the school supports our vision for our church as it will allow us to "...welcome and value all God's people, where they can grow, discover, and share their gifts in the church and in the world".

Please contact Amy, Christy, or the church office to see how you can help prepare our church and worship service to receive all families that may seek our church as a place of worship. We are fortunate to have the families and students entering our building for education. Let's provide an exceptional worship service and church community for when they are seeking a place to worship. 

The Church Revival Team (CRT) met three times during the past two months. The primary goal of the meetings was to discuss the Oxford Revival where over a four-day period, Centennial Park had youth programs, prayer, skits, praise music, speakers from local churches and Peter Warren as the guest speaker. The Oxford Revival....in our time, in our town, was on August 24 – 27. The CRT discussed ways in which our church could accommodate the downtown Revival as well as ways we can promote Oxford UMC.

The CRT discussed the time to start our Youth Program, which will commence in early October. Steve Laidlaw and Michelle Wood will be spearheading this endeavor and will seek advice from numerous church members to have a faith grounded youth program that is fun and inspiring.

Christy Turk has been asked to collaborate with Pastor and Becky to enhance the Church's website and to ensure it's constantly monitored and kept current and relevant. The CRT has placed a great emphasis on the Book "The

Outward Mindset" and realized that we have to be intentional in always being cognizant of others in the community and outside our four walls. The focus must be on others and not ourselves. This selfless thinking will only enhance our ways to be Christ-like in our actions and ministries.

- ♦ What needs to change in our worship that will make it more inviting and spirit filled to serve God?

CRT will seek having a more scripture filled service, more upbeat music and having music being played as members and guests are walking into the sanctuary.

The Church Revival Team would love to hear your thoughts on these questions.

<u>Ever Outward</u>

Poet Rainer Maria Rilke said, "I live my life in widening circles that reach out across the world." Indeed, we all do. As newborns, we focus only on ourselves. But as we grow, little by little we learn that the people and things around us are separate from us. Soon we can attend to others' actions, needs and feelings. Like ripples from a stone dropped in water, our circles of care widen from family (biological or otherwise) to friends (playmates, classmates, colleagues), church family, community, country and finally even people across the globe.

"Bill Russell: What a Legacy"


The recent death of Bill Russell brought to mind some fond memories. My classmate, Ervin, and I were divinity students at Drew University. We enjoyed watching NBA games on the old TV in the dormitory recreation room. It was during the Bill Russell – Wilt Chamberlain era. Ervin and I decided that we would go to Madison Square Garden and see what we knew would be a thrilling basketball game. It was the Boston Celtics vs. the Philadelphia Warriors. We would get to see Russell and Chamberlain go head-to-head on the basketball court.

We caught the train in Madison, NJ and made our way to New York City's Old Madison Square Garden. We went to the ticket window and to our chagrin, the game was sold out. Now what would two poor theologues do to get into an NBA game when the only tickets available would be the tickets offered by the scalpers. As we stood in the milling crowd, a man approached us with tickets in his hand. He asked if we wanted tickets for the game. We said yes (but was this guy a scalper?) We asked him how much he wanted for the tickets.

The man's response surprised us, because he only wanted what he had paid for the tickets originally. He was a scout master and he had brought his scouts to see the game. We bought the tickets and went into the Garden. We were blessed by an angel sent by God.

After we arrived at our seats and sat down for a time, I looked down into the section in front of us. I had a second surprise of the evening; my brother was sitting there. Because there was a barrier separating the sections, I asked a man if he would go down and summon my brother who was stationed in New York at the time. Bill walked up to my location and we chatted for a while prior to the game. We had no idea that we would see each other at this game. It was a pleasant surprise encounter.

I can still see the image of Russell and Chamberlain leaning on each other in an effort to gain some advantage

they played the game that night. Russell knew that he could not readily stop Chamberlain from shooting, so his effort focused on stopping him from getting the ball. We witnessed the battle between the two premier NBA centers.

As a fledging high school basketball player in the late fifties, I greatly admired Bill Russell as a basketball player. It was exciting to watch him play and to witness his defensive prowess. At times he would cause an opponent to miss a shot simply due to his intimidating presence which caused an opponent to think that Russell might block his shot. He was my basketball idol, and he inspired me to be a better defensive player.

Bill Russell died on July 31, 2022 at the age of 88. He and his teammates won 11 NBA championships. Russell was an MVP champion on the court and a civil rights champion off of the court. He did not hesitate to advocate for the civil rights causes of Muhammed Ali and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He stood tall for freedom and justice. It is fitting for the NBA to retire his number "six" league wide to honor his legacy.

What a legacy. Think about it!

After all, Christian fellowship can't occur without fellow Christians. We can't learn the intricacies of the Bible and theology without preachers and teachers. We don't baptize ourselves. We don't take Holy Communion alone; in fact, the sacrament's very name refers to interaction with God and others.

The New Testament clearly states that one cannot be Christian all alone. We are members of Christ's body (Ephesians 5:30). We belong to the family of believers (Galatians 6:10). We are "a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people" (1 Peter 2:9, NRSV). So don't be a lone ranger or a stranger — to worship or to Holy Communion!

Helpful things to know about Rachel Circle:


> We meet the second Monday of each Month at 10am -11:30am

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
