East Winds District News

LANSING MI...Bishop David A. Bard announces to the Michigan Conference the appointment of the Reverend John Kasper as district superintendent of the East Winds District, effective July 1, 2025. Rev. Kasper is currently serving as the district superintendent of the Central Bay District. He will follow the Rev. Dr. Margie Crawford, who has been a district superintendent since 2018. Rev. Dr. Crawford has been appointed as pastor of Northville United Methodist Church, effective July 1.

With Rev. Kasper serving as superintendent of two



districts, Bishop Bard also announces the appointment of the Rev. John Hice as half-time assistant to the East Winds DS, effective July 1. Rev. Hice is being appointed as a retired **Immediately** elder. preceding his retirement, Rev. Hice served as district superintendent for the East Winds District. It expected that this appointment will continue through the end of 2025.

Bishop Bard is making these appointments in light of likely changes to the Michigan Conference budget. Bishop Bard: "Even though finances play a significant

role in these decisions, I am pleased that our current cabinet is willing to think creatively about superintending moving into the future. We will continue to think and imagine new ways of fulfilling our Disciplinary responsibilities while helping the churches of our conference explore unique ways to grow in vital mission and ministry. I am very grateful to Rev. Kasper and Rev. Hice for their willingness to assume new responsibilities."

Bishop Bard said: "Making a new appointment to the cabinet is always a joy, and always also means a loss. The Rev. Dr. Margie Crawford has served as a district superintendent faithfully and well. Her ministry in both the Western Waters and East Winds districts has been deeply appreciated. She has served with her keen mind, out of her deep faith and love for the church. She has cared deeply about the congregations and clergy under her care. Her cabinet colleagues and I will miss her."

The 2026 budget proposal, if approved, will provide funds for five district superintendents for the Michigan Conference. Bishop Bard will work with the cabinet and other conference leaders on a plan for superintending and districts to be proposed to the 2026 annual conference session. "We will want to think in new and creative ways about how our annual conference provides support for and supervision of our clergy and how we can encourage and provide resources for local congregations and ministries as they seek to be vibrant places for the ministry of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

Overtaken by God's Love

When Jesus entered Jerusalem on the back of a borrowed donkey, it was indeed a triumphal arrival and entrance. Matthew 21:1-11 describes Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. As Jesus made his way on the back of a donkey, "a very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowd that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, 'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven'." At this time the whole city was in turmoil. Some wanted to know who is this man. The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth of Galilee." This event is known to modern day Christians as Palm Sunday, and it marks the beginning of Holy Week.

As Jesus made the decision to go to Jerusalem at this particular time, he surely was mindful of his great love for all people. Also, he was guided by the fact that God had sent him into the world because of God's great love for the world's people (John 3:16). Jesus had spent his entire ministry teaching the principles of Love: love God; love your neighbor; even as you love yourself. Jesus demonstrated his abiding love when he invited his disciples to join him for a sacred meal – the Last Supper. Jesus took a towel. He washed the disciples' feet. He shared the bread and the cup with them. Jesus practiced inclusivity, because he invited Judas who would betray him; he included Peter who would deny him three times;

he included the other disciples, all of whom would later desert him. In spite of these ominous acts looming on the horizon of time, Jesus dared to enter Jerusalem and shower his disciples with his love on Maundy Thursday.

On the next day, Good Friday, Jesus gave his life on the cross. Out of love and compassion, Jesus told the criminal who asked to be remembered that "truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43). The disciples, who had spent three years of in-service training with Jesus, watched his crucifixion from a distance. They were afraid that they might be identified as Jesus' disciples and be crucified too, just like their teacher.

On that Sunday, the third day, God raised Jesus from death to life. After Jesus' resurrection and appearances to the disciples, the disciples went to the Upper Room and spent a long time in prayer and meditation. When the day of Pentecost came, they stood tall for Jesus and expressed their love for Jesus. They had been overtaken by God's love.

Do you have the courage to enter Jerusalem with Jesus? Are you willing to pick up your cross and bear your cross as you journey with Jesus in an upside-down world? # <u>Plumb the Depths of our</u> <u>Rich History</u>

As we near Easter, Bishop David Bard asks us to proclaim the message of a loving and redeeming God who remains ever near, the same message that has been carried by so many before us...



In the last six months, it has been my joy and privilege to travel with groups from both the Michigan Conference and the Illinois Great Rivers Conference (IGRC). I just returned from a trip to Greece and Rome... following Paul's travels and seeing some of the seminal sites in the history of Western civilization.

Seeing these magnificent sites and structures, I pondered, "What did Paul have to offer in his preaching?" When one thinks of Rome, Peter must also be included. So, what about the preaching of Peter and Paul attracted persons to follow this Jesus, a Jesus crucified at the hands of the Roman Empire but then proclaimed as risen?

Monotheism may have been attractive to some. Throughout Greece and Rome, temples were built to various gods. Perhaps the simplicity of worshiping one God appealed to some, though there were certainly monotheistic trends in other religions of the time, including those in Egypt.

More important, though, was the character and nature of this single God proclaimed by Paul and Peter. This God was genuinely caring. This God was concerned for the well-being of all persons. While traveling ... I could not avoid the impression that the religious systems of all three were hierarchically structured and that those higher up in the social system were also closer to the gods. The God of Jesus Christ did not distinguish between rich and poor, ruler and ruled, in caring and concern. "There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28, NRSVUE). In the Egyptian, Greek, and Roman religions, the emperors were given titles such as "son of God" and "savior." In the Christian faith, all can be considered children of God, and our savior is a Jew from a backwater province who was crucified by the empire.

The notion of a caring and concerned God is rooted in the faith of the Hebrews and is now extended in Jesus to all persons. And this caring and concerned God is always near in the resurrected Christ. People responded to this message. And while the message of the Christian faith is about an accessible God, there is also a sense that some places can be places of special encounter with this God of Jesus Christ. Some have labeled them as "thin spaces," places where the presence of God in the risen Christ seems remarkably powerful. One cannot travel to Greece and Rome without being taken by the remarkable church structures that have been thin places for many people: St. Peter's Basilica, the Sistine Chapel, and monasteries built on the Greek

mountains in Meteora. Icons, in their unique artistry, provide a powerful reminder of the presence of God.

The message of a caring, concerned, and accessible God often threatened the empire. To worship the usual gods supported the imperial structures and systems. To worship the God of Jesus Christ might lead people to question those systems and structures. The relationship between the Christian faith and the philosophical and religious ideas of the Greeks and Romans remains interesting. Some early Christians, such as Justin Martyr (AD 100-165), taught that as all truth comes from God, the truth that may be found in Greek and Roman philosophy should be welcomed by Christians. Unfortunately, his Christian faith still cost him. Justin was beheaded for refusing to renounce his faith, likely and ironically, during the reign of Emperor Marcus Aurelius, an emperor keen on philosophy.

When the empire fell, there was a time when the Christians showed little concern for its grand structures. Marble from the Colosseum in Rome was taken and used for building homes. Later, popes and other authorities began to appreciate the importance of these ancient structures. Archaeologists have uncovered wonderful places that tell us about our history and help it come alive. Walking the ancient streets of Corinth, where Paul walked, is an amazing experience I have had twice these past six months. I will be processing these trips for some time. I come away with a desire to dig deeply into the rich wells of our Christian tradition. I encourage you to do so as well. People have been following Jesus for nearly two thousand years, and we have much to learn from them. They have worshiped in caves, catacombs, and church buildings, ranging from the simple to the grand and ornate...

In plumbing the depths of our history, we must also acknowledge where we have gotten things wrong in following Jesus. The church has sometimes uncritically embraced hierarchies of value inconsistent with our faith. The church has often found itself enamored with the power of Caesars. In our history, we have justified slavery and racism. In the 1920s, Congress passed an immigration act that set strict quotas on immigrants from Eastern and Southern Europe. Our founders often referred to the thought of the Greeks and Romans, but ironically, in 1924, we decided we did not want to allow many Greeks or Italians into the country.

The heart of our faith, though, is always an appreciation of each person as a unique creation of God, created in the image of God — a God who cares and seeks the well-being of God's creation and its redemption and salvation. This God came near in Jesus and remains near in the risen Christ. On Easter morning, when we sing out, "Christ the Lord is risen today," it is not a statement about the past but about the present. Today! The message of a loving and redeeming God who remains ever near, the message carried by Paul and Peter and so many others through the centuries, remains our message to share. Celebrate this. Plumb the depths of our rich history. Share the story.


### Seizing Holy Opportunities

In *Holy Moments*, Matthew Kelly discusses the world's need for more small (but sometimes large) instances of people caring for others, cultivating joy, encouragement and love instead of anger, envy, fear. Kelly defines a Holy Moment as "a single moment in which you open yourself to God. ... You set aside personal preference and self-interest, and for one moment you do what you prayerfully believe God is telling you to do."

This may mean mowing the lawn for a neighbor with a broken leg, praising a child on his artwork, buying a surprise snack for someone having a bad day, working extra shifts for a coworker with cancer so she can receive her full salary while out sick, paying for the next car's drive-thru order. Anyone can create a Holy Moment, because you don't need special skills, position or wealth. "If you want to see miracles, make yourself available to God," Kelly suggests.

He adds that God has a track record of collaborating with "the most unlikely people to make amazing things happen, and now He wants to collaborate with you." When we're open to God's leading, holy opportunities abound. And we will experience as much joy as the ones to whom we show care.





### Loving My "Enemies"

In polarized times, when people view huge concepts such as justice, government policy and care for neighbors differently, how do we follow Jesus' command to love our enemies? I prefer the word opponents, but our Lord's instructions still stand.


In the Bible, "love" doesn't mean liking someone; it means caring for them, treating them kindly. I find The Message paraphrase of Luke 6:27-36 helpful: "Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst," Jesus says about one's enemies. So, when I contact government leaders to express my opinions, I address them with respect, whether I agree with them or not. When I encounter a neighbor whose views oppose mine, I ask myself what I would want them to do for me, whether help with an errand or be friendly. Then, as The Message puts it, I "grab the initiative and do it for them."

And this, which might be the hardest: Amid tough times, Jesus says, "Respond with the supple moves of prayer." It's human nature to pray that God change our enemies' or opponents' minds. But it's more Christlike to pray for their health, their families and whatever God desires for them, not what I want. Can I do this? With God's help, ves.


Make this keepsake to express love for your dad or another special man this Father's Day.


